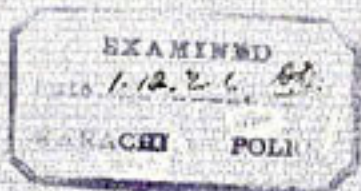

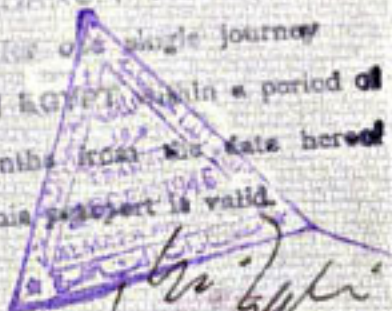

REGISTRATION AT BRITISH CONSULATES ABROAD

It is most important that British subjects resident abroad should at the earliest opportunity register their names and addresses at the nearest British Consulate.

Failure to register may in a period of emergency result in difficulty or delay in according British subjects the assistance and protection to which they are entitled.

Changes of address or departure from the country should also be notified to the Consulate.

EXTRACT FROM PASSPORT REGULATIONS.

1. Applications for Indian Passports must be made in the prescribed form and returned either direct or through the local authority—

(a) in the case of a resident in British India to the Provincial Government concerned;

(b) in the case of a resident in an Indian State, to the Political Officer concerned.

2. The charge for an Indian Passport is Rs. 5.

3. Indian Passports are granted to—

(a) British Subjects by Birth;

(b) Husbands and widows of such persons;

(c) British subjects by naturalization;

(d) British-protected persons.

4. A British woman is deemed to be a subject of the State of which her husband is by her own being a subject.

5. Passports are granted upon the production of a declaration by the applicant in the case of a child under 14 requiring a separate Passport by the child's parent or guardian in the prescribed form of application verified by a declaration made by a Police Officer, Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Police Officer not below the rank of Superintendent or Notary Public, resident in India.

6. The application for a Passport to a British Subject by Naturalization, the certificate of naturalization must be forwarded with the facts of application to the authorities to grant the Passport. It will be returned with the Passport to the applicant through the person who may have verified the declaration.

7. Non subjects by Naturalization will be described as such, in their Passports, which will be issued in accordance with the necessary qualifications.

8. Two duplicate stamped photographs of the applicant (and wife, if so be required) to be forwarded with the application for a Passport, one of which must be returned to the person verifying the declaration made in the application.

9. Indian Passports are not available beyond five years from date of issue. They may be renewed for a further maximum period of five years after which the Passports must be re-issued. The fee for renewal is Rs. 1 for each year or part of a year, for which the Passport is renewed.

10. Visas cannot be issued or renewed on behalf of persons already abroad; such visas should apply for Passports to the London Foreign Office or to British Consulates or Commissions. Passports must not be sent out of India by air.

11. In case of an applicant for a Passport being unable to write English, a statement in English should be placed below the applicant's vernacular signature in the form of application. In the case of an illiterate person, a thumb impression should be substituted for a signature on the form of application which should be attested by the person verifying the declaration.

12. The passport is only available for travel to the countries named on page 4, and is not endorsed for additional countries. The fee for each further endorsement is Rs. 1, except that no fee is imposed in respect of territories which are British Empire. The possession of a Passport or endorsed does not exempt the holder from compliance with any immigration laws in force in British Foreign Countries, or from the necessity of obtaining a visa where required.

13. Passports endorsed as valid for the British Empire are also available for travelling elsewhere under British protection or mandate, and, however, including Palestine or Transjordan, for which the Passport must be specially endorsed, after Adeq Tarkomah, for which both an endorsement and a new fee apply.

14. Non subjects resident abroad should in all cases register their names and addresses at the nearest British Consulate. Such registration constitutes the main evidence in emergency or difficulty of granting all proper assistance or advice to be afforded them. Changes of address in or departure from the country residence should also be notified to the Consulate.

15. Persons merely passing through a foreign country or making a short stay there are not regarded as residents, and need not register unless their stay exceeds that time.
